

Solo Down the Pacific Coast Highway

Come to the **Tuesday, October 7th** meeting at **7:00 p.m.** to hear about long-time Ski Club member Guy Miller's trip of a lifetime . . . solo on a bicycle down the Pacific Coast Highway.

First of all, what does this have to do with cross-country skiing? Nothing much, unless you believe that there are other things to do for eight months of the year, and that staying fit and active is a good strategy for year-long ski conditioning.

Fifteen years ago, Guy promised himself that after retiring he would do a bicycle trip along the Pacific Coast Highway (PCH), ". . . from top to bottom," as he put it. Having previously done three separate segments of the PCH with his wife, he already had an idea what he was in for. "Just look at the map," he said; "it's all down hill, isn't it?"

After thinking about it casually over the years, he started researching in earnest a year before he retired. By early autumn of 2006, he had his basic itinerary, and by spring of 2007, he had acquired the custom built touring bike that was part of his promise, as well as all of the equipment he expected to need. He shoved off in mid-June and returned home 70 days later.

Although most bicycle guidebooks advise starting from the southern third of Vancouver Island, British Columbia, Guy claims that he started in remote Port Hardy, the northern-most outpost of civilization on the Island. He further asserts that he cycled the length of the island, crossed over to Washington, continued south through Oregon, and got as far as Big Sur in California. He says that he has photos and a journal to document this alleged journey, which is a good thing, because some of the things that he says



More experienced skiers in the group declared that this cabin was the Ritz compared to others . . . among a few of the amenities were pillows, sheets, solar lighting, a walkway to the outhouse and even a French press for coffee! At night we gathered as a team and prepared the home-cooked food (*thanks to Sherry and Bob*), melted snow for water and sat around the central wood stove as we drank wine and shared our lives stories.

Day skiing included class 1+ ski tours ranging from four to ten miles. Snow was deep and on the first day was somewhat icy in spots. Day two brought a sprinkling of fresh powder. Several skiers made it five miles up to another cabin where they weathered forty miles per hour winds and snow. Those of us remaining were glad to see them make it back safely early evening. They were tired but satisfied that they'd made it out and back in such weather. I believe Guy is leading another trip into this cabin. I would advise you take the opportunity to go. He's a great leader and the trip will be magnificent.

The largest diamond in this adventure was the people. We laughed, shared duties without

Salida – Thurs-Sun, Feb 26-Mar 1, leaves 2 p.m.
Pagosa Springs – Fri-Sun, Mar 6-8, leaves 4 p.m.

How to Sign Up for the Bus Trips

Before registering, please read the complete club policy on long trips that is posted on the website at www.naturediscovery.org/nmccskiclub as well as the following summary.

Enclosed with this newsletter you will find registration forms. Please send a separate check for each trip for which you register. **If you want to room with a certain person you must register together on one slip and send checks together.** The mailing address is on the registration form. **Please do not send checks to the Club's PO Box.**

Please be sure to include all contact information requested on your sign-up form, e.g., cell phone, email address and emergency contact.

Typically, single members who are drawn will be paired with other same gender singles. Since many names are used for both genders, always indicate Ms. or Mr. on the form.

As long as the demand for bus trip seats exceeds our supply, we will hold a lottery drawing on **November 15th, 2008**, (Saturday following the November Club meeting) to determine who is on the trips. Board members have first priority to sign up for trips as an incentive to serve this organization. There will be at least 3 board members present at the drawing. After all seats for a trip are filled, we will place the remaining registrations in "reserve pool" and their original checks will be destroyed. It costs nothing to

remain in "reserve" status. We will keep your registration unless you notify us that you are no longer interested in that trip. For those drawn to be on the trip, your cancelled check will be your receipt. Most often when members cancel, they sell their seat to someone in the "reserve pool". However, it is their seat and they may sell it to anyone who is over 18, same sex, and a member of the Club. **The bus trip chairs must be informed of any changes.**

The roster of attendees for all trips will be posted on the website and mailed in the November newsletter immediately after the drawing. Complete details of each trip will be emailed to participants if we have email addresses four weeks prior to the trip, otherwise it will be snail-mailed. **If you do not receive notifications in a timely manner, it is your responsibility to contact us for the information at (505) 294-4112 or rsberg01@comcast.net.**

Bus Trip Guidelines

Who may go: Paid-up Club members, at least 18 years old.

Departure: Times will depend on the trip. Check the individual trip descriptions. Buses depart from the west side of the Target parking lot at I-25 on Paseo Del Norte. We will be in the parking lot one hour before departure to load the bus and pass out boarding passes in the order of your arrival. You will only be able to reserve one seat per pass. The bus will board ½ hour before the scheduled departure time.

Bus Ride: The Club supplies cold sodas, water, wine and beer on the bus. **There is a restroom on the bus except for the Lake City trip.** We will pick up a "to go" dinner in Durango on the way to Telluride. The bus will make a dinner stop on the way to Lake City and Salida at Taqueria Calvillo in Alamosa, CO. You should bring your own food or eat in advance of departure on the Pagosa Springs trip.

Luggage: Pack your skis in a ski bag. You are allowed one large or two small suitcases per person. Cargo area is at a premium so please be considerate of others. You may bring a six-pack type cooler if it fits under your seat. **A cooler size of 8-1/2"W x 12"L x 9-1/2"H** will normally fit under any seat.

Hotel: If you need a roommate, we will find one of the same gender for you.

Meals: Meals are provided as outlined in each trip description. All other meals are your responsibility. Cooking generally is not allowed in hotel rooms. You may bring breakfast and lunch foods in your cooler. You must bring your own food and water when going out to ski. On ski days, the bus normally leaves the hotel at about 8:00 or 9:00 a.m. and returns to the hotel in the late afternoon.

Skiing: We attempt to go to a variety of areas to accommodate skiers of all abilities. There may be set-track areas or downhill skiing available, but our main pursuit is cross-country skiing.

NEVER SKI ALONE. You may ski by yourself if you are at a Nordic Center as long as you let somebody else know.

Clothes: “Casual, warm and layered” are the key words. We often walk to dinner so bring warm clothing for evenings. Slip-on crampons (*Yak Traks*) are very useful.

Cost: The cost of the trip is derived from the estimated cost of the bus, hotel, drinks, snacks, included meals, club surcharge, and bus driver’s tip divided by the number of people on the trip. Once you have paid your deposit you are on the trip. The balance is due by the dates given on the trip registration form. **Payments are not refundable.** If you cancel you must find a substitute and settle the payment with that person. You will be given names in the “reserve pool”.

Reserve: The “reserve pool” will be started once a trip is full. It costs nothing to be on “reserve” status and you have an excellent chance of getting on a trip if you are interested. There are **often last minute cancellations for a variety of reasons, so keep the trip weekends open on your calendar!**

Club Cancellation Policy

In the event that a bus trip cannot be completed due to events beyond Club control, such as weather, road conditions, mechanical failure, etc. any money that is not already committed will be equally divided and distributed among trip participants.

Instructions for Signing Up

We need to have the form in hand for the November 15, 2008 drawing date.

- Please send the completed form with the deposit to:
 - Thea Berg, 13501 Osage Orange Rd NE, Albuquerque, NM 87111-8218.
 - You may bring the form and deposit to the October or November Cross Country Ski Club meetings.
- If you would like to room with a particular person, you must submit applications for both roommates together.
- You must submit separate forms for each trip.
- Deposit for each trip must be on separate checks.
- You must be a Club member and have paid your dues by the November Club meeting in order to be eligible for any bus trip drawing, if a drawing is required.
- Once your application has been accepted, you own the seat and owe the balance for the trip. If you change your mind, you may only sell or give your seat to an eligible NMCCSC member.

- Please be sure to note the meal arrangements for each trip, as they are each different.
- Contact us if you do not receive information in a timely manner. Our information on how to contact you may be incorrect.

Section House 3-Nighter Hut Trip By Guy Miller

Departure date: February 28, 2009

Return date: March 4 or March 5 (depending on travel conditions)

Due to the number of bus trips this year, I may be leading only two hut trips in 2009. Section House is our second scheduled trip, set for early March.

Section House is part of the Summit Huts system, but is administered by the 10th Mountain Hut Association. This Colorado Historic Site was, in the late 1800's, home to a railroad section supervisor and his family. We are told it is currently inhabited by ghosts. Seriously. Right next to it is Ken's Cabin, which also carries historic site credentials. This three-person hut was a miner's shelter that was moved in the 1990's to its current location. These huts are unlike any to be found in the 10th Mountain or Summit Huts systems.

We will visit Section House for three nights, March 1-3. **Please note that this time frame conflicts with the Salida bus trip.** We are taking only 10 skiers to the one hut, but we could squeeze in two more, and we may try to reserve Ken's Hut for a few more people if there is demand. These huts sit astride scenic Boreas Pass, right outside of Breckenridge. There are three routes in to the hut, none of them particularly daunting. One of the routes is especially suitable for strong beginners, and will be the one we take if there is sufficient interest from that particular demographic.

As of press time, we have two vacancies for this trip. Total cost for the trip (exclusive of transportation, lodging and food to and from the trailhead) is \$139.
